

Personally appeared before me, the Subscriber,
a Notary Public for and throughout the State of New-
Hampshire; John Pitman, of Portsmouth in the aforesaid
State, aged eighty five years, who, being duly sworn, deposes
and saith; that, by reason of old age, and the consequent
loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise
length of his service, but according to the best of his re-
ollection he served not less than the period mentioned
below, as a private soldier: vizt For twelve months
I served as a private in Capt. Daniel's company, of
which Company Seth Walker was a Lieutenant and it
was stationed at Fort Sullivan in Portsmouth Harbour:
^{during the year 1776}
and, I believe, Colonel Price Long had the command
of all the troops in this neighbourhood, and for such
service I claim a pension: And I hereby
relinquish every claim to any other pension than
the one under the Act of June 7th 1832: And I
on oath state, that there is no Clergyman in this Town
or vicinity now living, who was here, as such, during the
Revolution.
